Project Overview


- The State Park Extends 50+ Miles From Portland to Thompson
- 80,859 Annual Trail Users (2023 CT Trail Census Data in E. Hampton)
- Proposed Trail is the former Air Line Railroad est. in 1885







Resource Coordination

- Fisheries determined that the project will not significantly impact fisheries or habitat
- Natural Diversity Data Base (NDDB) Determination not within an NDDB area
- US Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) Official Species List determined there would be no effect on the Northern Long-eared Bat or the Tri-Colored Bat
- State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) Review determined no concerns
- Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) Review determined no concerns
- This project includes removal of invasive species and establishment of perennial vegetation in disturbed areas.

Approximate Construction Schedule


2025 – Complete Design, obtain permits, and project advertise.

2026 – Expected construction start, anticipated construction schedule of 6 – 9 months. Existing utility poles will be removed as a part of this project.
